

Purpose of Field Trip: The 9th Grade Trip to Washington, DC is an annual trip that provides Bromfield students with an opportunity to experience the nation's capital as a culmination of their two year study of American History. The students will visit all of the major memorials, see the exteriors of both the White House and Capitol, tour the National Cathedral, and explore the Smithsonian Museum and the Newseum. There they will be able to make connections between the memorials and landmarks and the curriculum in United States History I and II. For example, the depiction of the soldiers in the Korean War Memorial illustrates for students the hardships the men endured in a way that classroom instruction cannot, and the four "rooms" of the FDR Memorial highlight the defining moments of President Roosevelt's four terms of office and visually summarize what the students learn in class. Moreover, the trip serves as a unifying activity for the class, allowing them the potential for social growth and interpersonal relationships that is impossible to replicate in the classroom. The students should return from the trip with a new appreciation for past presidents and the US government, an awareness of the wealth of educational and cultural opportunities in Washington, DC, and a strengthened bond with their classmates and teachers.

Organizational Goals and Objects:

We would like to initiate Bromfield Robotics as a club that incorporates a fun, educational program for students interested in STEM. The club would have weekly meetings where students can learn about robotics and grow their interest for STEM fields. One of the founding objectives of this club is to compete in the First Tech Challenge (FTC), a 10 weeks robotics competition which kicks off in September. We want to represent Bromfield and our STEM capabilities to compete in Massachusetts and possibly beyond. An FTC team itself is composed of around 3-15 students and are given 10 weeks to design and build a robot. Tournament progression wise, there are a few qualifying tournaments in the Massachusetts league, a state final, a regionals championship, and a world's championship. The competitive portion of the club would operate at different times than the club meetings as the process would require more specific focus than what the club meetings would go over. The 10 week period would be open to the competitive members who are seeking to participate in the FTC team and after the competition the club would open up to have the weekly meetings with the rest of the club.

FTC competitiveness is rated in two ways: game score and engineering notebook. Game score is representative of the effectiveness of the team's robot to play that season's game, both build design and software. The engineering notebook is divided into 3 sections: documentation of the robot's engineering process, community outreach involving the team, and a business or sustainability plan.

This organization is intended to be the seed or starting point of further and future STEM growth at Bromfield. Overarching to the competitive team is the robotics club intended for those who cannot commit to the FTC team but have interests in robotics, programming, and the like. After the competition season, the team members would like to shift focus to the student body and spread the knowledge they've learned. We want to foster more interest in STEM areas by

applying the foundations FIRST offers. This means future interaction with the Hildreth Elementary School (HES) students through another FIRST program, the FIRST Lego League (FLL), a program like FTC which is intended for elementary or middle school students to promote scientific interests at an earlier age.

The club meetings would incorporate a fun and educational place where students can learn about the components of robotics; engineering, programming, and design. During the club meetings the groups could build electronics projects, working with beginner arduino kits, discuss interesting scientific ideas / news.

Rationales:

STEM interest - interest students in STEM fields through the hands on approach of developing a robot.

Creative problem solving - break down a complex problem and use the engineering process to solve it.

Teamwork - foster an ability to work with peers.

Commitment - dedication to an organization to work diligently and represent a team.

Community outreach - interaction with HES and potentially local businesses, supporting community solvency.

Role of faculty advisor:

Provide necessary adult supervision for the FTC competition, guide students on learning and problem solving.

Projected time commitment for advisor:

An hour or so on a near-daily basis after school for the first ten weeks of the school year for advisory and supervision on the FTC competition.

Involvement and chaperoning at FTC weekend tournaments.

Superintendent Report

Dr. Dwight reported on the following:

*The interview committee met with the NV5 team including the new member assigned to our project. During that meeting we reviewed the Request for Services (RFS) for the architect/design firm and the timeline.

*Following that meeting, member of the SBC continued to provide edits to the RFS that will be sent to the Central Registry later this week.

Share October 1 Enrollment Numbers
